It is a natural human desire to seek a longer and healthier life. Some even seek to live forever, and many religions promise "everlasting life". Critics say that such claims are impossible, or at least unprovable. For those interested in the scientific approach, however, there is evidence that increased healthspan (healthy years), and increased lifespan, maybe attainable goals through scientific methods.

Firstly, we must be able to define how long humans live "before life extension" in order to determine if science is making progress towards healthspan and life extension. That has not been an easy task, due to the traditions of Longevity mythology, which are near-universal across most world cultures. As untrue but exorbitant age claims far exceed the actual maximum attainable ages, currently estimated in the range of 125 years, we must first develop methodologies that are able to separate false from real extreme age claims.

Such an approach is useful to create actuarial life insurance tables and estimate future pension and social security obligations. It also is helpful to determine the current biological potential for the maximum human lifespan and extract patterns why some people live longer than others.

The process to separate extreme Longevity data into verified and unverified data pools is called validation. The current age validation theory was developed in the 1870s by William Thoms: as he was studying folk tales, he noticed that many of the extreme ages claimed by impoverished, illiterate or semi-literate persons in the UK often far exceeded the actual ages reached in real life insurance policies. When he began his investigation of this phenomenon that the poor apparently outliving the wealthy, then the oldest age recorded in a life insurance policy of the wealthy only was 97 years. Thoms went on to investigate many age claims to ages 100+ and published his research journey and methods in the book Human Longevity: Its Factions and Its Fictions (1873). Thoms made the astute observation that in not one case where persons claimed to be 110+ was possible for him to verify the claim.

Several tests were devised, including the 100th birthday test (check to see if the person had claimed to be age 100 at the proper time in relation to the extreme age claim), checking for vital records such as birth, marriage, and death, and comparing the person within the context of their family tree. All this work resulted in the concept of age validation, which proved remarkably effective: any claims older than 103 could be verified. It turned out that the poor were NOT living longer; rather, the poor were more likely to be illiterate and exaggerate their age.

William Thoms research was primarily limited to those persons with life insurance policies, not a whole-population sample, which may have yielded valid ages higher than 103. But it was a great foundational start to age validation. Thoms research, who died in 1882, was quickly taken up by Thomas Emley Young, who became the president of the Institute of Actuaries, London. Young instituted the very first attempt to track extreme Longevity via the concept of monitoring validated ages to 100+ by way of "age in years and days". In 1898 Young verified that Margaret Ann Neve, then 106, of the Channel Islands, was a validated case. Ms. Neve went on to become the first person validated in real-time to reach age 110 in 1902. Also, it was verified that a Dutchman, Geert Boomgaard, had reached age 110 in 1898, but his age was verified through documentation much later.

The idea of verifying a few "case examples" continued with Alexander Graham Bell, better-known for developing the telephone. Many people today are not aware that over a century ago, Alexander Graham Bell of Canada was noted for his study of centenarians, even opening a sort of "centenarian institute", and was featured in National Geographic Magazine along with Ann Pouder, then thought to be 110 (recent research suggests she could have been 109 instead).

The 1920s saw several more "likely-true" supercentenarian cases, including Louisa Thiers of the USA (said to be 111), Delina Filkinsof the USA (verified to be 113), and Miriam Bannister (aged 111). A time after WWI, the 1920s were generally a prosperous era. So it's not a surprise to see some extreme but valid ages emerge: people were living longer in better conditions than before. Yet this period was followed by the 1930s (the Great Depression) and then the 1940s (World War II) which saw great losses of human lives on the order of tens of millions.

Only after WWII did the advent of the 1950s, a decade of relative world stability, the interest in extreme human Longevity returned. Indeed, the start of Guinness World Records in 1955 began with Betsy Baker (UK-USA), aged 113. The concept of extreme Longevity as a "world record" moved the subject of supercentenarians beyond the study of the actuaries and demographers and brought it to the attention of the general public. In the USA, the 1950s also saw commemorations of "last Civil War veterans". Unfortunately, the oldest "veterans" were either false or exaggerated. Walter Williams claimed to be "117" but was 105; John Salling claimed to be "113" but was 101: Albert Woolson claimed to be "109" but was 106.

The 1960s was another decade with a lot of media coverage of extreme Longevity. In the USA, alleged "ex-slaves" were often popping up in the news with claims to ages 120+. Meanwhile, other countries such as Russia had their own claims to extreme Longevity. This continued to build until the early 1970s when the myths of Longevity met scientific scrutiny.

Faced with claims to ages 130+ from places such as the Caucasus (Russia, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Armenia), Vilcabamba (Ecuador), and Hunza Valley (Pakistan), scientists such as Alexander Leaf began to question these age claims. Going back to the actuarial approach, scientific research in the 1970s helped to debunk these Longevity myths, including in the Caucasus (1974), Vilcabamba (1979), and even the USA (1979). Of particular note, the Vilcabamba study reduced the age of the oldest person in Vilcabamba Valley from 142 to 96. Charlie Smith of the USA, said to be 137, was actually 100 years old. No claim to older than 113+ could then be validated.

A new era began with the Shigechiyo Izumi case. Recognized by Guinness World Records as the "oldest living man" in 1978, based on Japan's koseki birth registration system, his case saw a new media focus in the early 1980s on "authenticated" ages, rather than unvalidated cases. However, there were still issues. When Izumi died in 1986, age "120" on paper, rumors that he might not have been the age claimed resurfaced. In 1987, Japanese researchers debunked this case, saying that he was using the birth registration of an older brother of the same name and was only age 105. But this report was only in the Japan press and did not reach international circulation until the advent of the internet. In 2010, Guinness World Records pulled support for this case, as those who had applied for Guinness recognition chose not to defend it.

That said, even if a case like this turned out to be erroneous, the search process for identifying the "oldest living person" was starting to re-implement the ideas of William Thoms from a century-plus earlier. Researcher E. Ross Eckler, Jr. helped establish that Delina Filkins had legitimately reached age 113 in 1928. The search was on to find someone age 114+. And that search did not last long: in 1987, Anna Eliza Williams of the UK turned 114, followed closely by Florence Knapp of the USA. Both were well-validated cases and have withstood the test of time. Since these cases, nearly all Guinness-recognized titleholders have retained their titles. The process was improving, the risk of a false positive case was receding.

Then the Jeanne Calment era began. Jeanne Calment was first recognized by Guinness World Records as the "oldest living person" in August 1988, retroactive to January 11, 1988 (the death of Florence Knapp). Noted in 1988 for the centenary of the visit of noted painter Van Gogh to the town of Arles in southern France, Jeanne said that she sold colored pencils to Van Gogh when she was 13, in 1888. A century later, Jeanne was still living. But she didn't stop at age 113. Jeanne reached age 120 in 1995 and later passed the Izumi case, then thought to be the record, in October 1995. Jeanne would live two more years, reaching age 122 years, 164 days on her day of death, August 4, 1997.

The Jeanne Calment case inspired a new era in age validation efforts. The GRG, which began in 1990 to study gerontology and potential ways to slow and ultimately reverse the effects of aging in humans, began tracking supercentenarians in 1997.

Dr. Coles wanted to follow up on the death of Jeanne Calment, 122, by attempting to locate new candidates for the world's oldest person and to track supercentenarians. While Guinness World Records located Marie-Louise Meilleur, then 116, as the new titleholder, the interest for the GRG to track this was spurred. Following the death of Guinness titleholder Sarah Knauss, 119, in 1999, Guinness World Records asked the GRG to become their consultant for the world's oldest living person in March 2000 (the GRG had already brought on board Louis Epstein, who independently tracked oldest living persons at www.recordholders.org, a Guinness World Records fan club, since 1991). The GRG's first case, Marie Bremont of France, 114, was accepted upon the death of Eva Morris, 114, of the UK in November 2000.

Meanwhile, other efforts at the age verification of supercentenarians were underway in Europe. Dr. James Vaupel founded the Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research in Rostock, Germany in 1996. The first international seminar on supercentenarians began there in 2000, bringing together experts in the field from places such as the GRG, European institutions such as INSERM, the US Social Security Administration, and the like. The International Database on Longevity began in France in 2002 with Jean-Marie Robine, chief validator of the Jeanne Calment case. Long just something for individual case validation, supercentenarian research efforts in the new age of the internet had begun to assemble supercentenarian data on a new scale: the supercentenarian database, a term to describe supercentenarian validation efforts on a population scale.

The results of the GRG and IDL supercentenarian databases quickly produced similar conclusions in several key topic areas:

- 1. The data established the gender ratio at age 110 of 90% female, 10% male.
- 2. The data showed that the annual human mortality rate at age 110 was close to .5 (rising closer to .67 or higher by age 114-117).
- 3. The data agreed with extreme value theory calculations which generally put the maximum calculated human lifespan in the range of age 123-128.
- 4. The data showed that, contrary to prior hypotheses, humans did not live long in special mountainous regions or valleys but that the maximum human lifespan was primarily controlled by factors such as population size and life expectancy, with a small portion attributed to climate (in particular, cool, wet weather led to lower maximum ages observed, whereas warmer, sunnier climates tended to produce older maximum ages).

5. The average of the world's oldest living person has been about 115 for the past 20 years or so, plus or minus one.

While these basic patterns emerged from a whole-population data analysis of supercentenarians, research plans extend beyond age validation. Both the GRG and the Supercentenarian Research Foundation, founded in 2004, began the biosampling of supercentenarians for a study. While individual supercentenarian autopsies had been performed in the 1990s in Japan and the USA, Dr. Coles's autopsy study of supercentenarians and amyloidosis in 2012 became the first scientific study on supercentenarians as a biological test group. Other studies followed from other groups such as the New England Supercentenarian Study, involving searching for genetic factors associated with supercentenarianism.

The search is just underway. Proper funding in this area could soon see one of the greatest breakthroughs in human history: scientifically-documented human life extension. But until then, the current record for the oldest validated person in human history remains that of Jeanne Calment, who is documented to have reached age 122 in 1997 in France.

Executive Summary

Throughout history, at least since the time of settled agricultural communities, there have always been human beings who have lived well beyond normal life expectancy, these 'supercentenarians' who lived past 110 years of age. What did not exist was a codified system of tracking and verifying these claims and separating fact from human error and false claims.

For much of human history and prehistory, stories of elders living exceptionally long-lived lives (110+ years) have permeated throughout most human cultures. What was not well understood, however, was how much of these stories were actual fact and how much was Longevity myth.

In the 1870s, William Thoms, who coined the term "folklore" and noticed much of these stories, developed a procedure for checking extreme age claims, called age validation. This system was, for the most part, applied only to individual cases. The first validated supercentenarians emerged in the 1890s, but remained isolated case examples.

In 1990, however, L. Stephen Coles, MD PhD created the Gerontology Research Group (GRG) which for the first time could verify and catalogue these claims as a systematic database. This was as part of the GRG's mission statement to "slow and ultimately reverse age-related decline for more healthy years of life". In order to know whether life extension treatments were effective, the GRG first needed a control group of data to determine how long humans were actually living prior to life extension. The New York Times wrote that the GRG has been recognized as "an authority on the matter" of verifying supercentenarians. The GRG is recognized as an authority on supercentenarians by Guinness World Records. The original chapter of the GRG, the LA-GRG, holds meetings each month but the organization has members worldwide who meet via online forums.

Executive Summary

In 2019 the Ageing Analytics Agency in association with the GRG have compiled this report highlighting some of the amazing personalities and demographics of the world's confirmed supercentenarians. The report also explores historical research of the top 100 living supercentenarians, which the Gerontology Research Group (GRG) and Aging Analytics Agency believe is crucial for the ongoing growth and development of the global Longevity movement.

Supercentenarians Validation

The Gerontology Research Group (GRG) is a global group of researchers in various fields that verifies and tracks supercentenarians, or people who are at least 110 years old in a list of the verified oldest people. The group also aims to further gerontology research with a goal of reversing or slowing aging.

It was founded in 1990 by L. Stephen Coles and Stephen M. Kaye after the two met at a conference, according to Coles. The original chapter of the GRG, the LA-GRG, holds meetings each month but the organization has members worldwide who meet via online forums.

A number of competent scientist regularly participate in its forum science discussions which reports and discusses recent research in such topics as cell rejuvenation, stem cell therapies, control of chronic inflammation, aging biomarkers, lifespan enhancement approaches effective in animals, meta-analyses of aging studies, centenarians and supercentenarians, new disease therapies, key proteins related to aging, supplements, anti-aging interventions.

The GRG verifies that people claiming to be supercentenarians are at least 110 years old by validating proof of age documents provided by the claimant or their family. People claiming to be supercentenarians, or their family members, are required to supply documents that prove the claimant's birth date, change of name (if applicable), and date of death (if applicable), along with another piece of official government identification. Researchers from the GRG verify that these documents are true and correct and if they are, the claimant is included in the GRG's official tables of supercentenarians.

The GRG also conducts research on aging by interviewing willing supercentenarians and collecting their blood and DNA samples. The GRG is recognized as an authority on supercentenarians by Guinness World Records and is often quoted in newspapers. As of September 19, 2019, the GRG recognizes approximately 35 living supercentenarians age 112+.

Supercentenarians Validation

Historically there have been just over 1,700 validated supercentenarians in total.

When that number is divided into nation-based demographics, the United States has a significant lead in the overall number of persons living to 110 or older, outpacing the next six nations combined. However, part of that is due to population size as the USA is the world's third-most populous nation and first among nations that had large-scale birth registration 110+ years ago. Per capita, Japan actually does better. When the national demographics are parsed down to an all-time top 100 supercentenarians, the USA still maintains a lead, but at this point not as dominant a one.



Gender Discrepancy Between Supercentenarians

Across all continents, it is clear the gender distribution of supercentenarians tilts heavily towards females, typically by a factor of 10. Even when the overall numbers are low – as is the case in Africa and Australia – the disparity remains. The global total is 1:10 towards women, and the trend cuts across cultures and disparate environmental factors. Even within the Supercentenarian group, those at the highest end tend to be exclusively women.

The discrepancy has informed the popular culture and mainstream media, with many outlets wondering aloud what the cause could be, although this has typically been from anecdotal evidence. While there is a universe of possible causes and correlations, the data alone solves many questions about differences between

- Climate
- Culture
- Genetics
- Other environmental factors

It should be noted, however, that the majority of the data has been pulled from the 20th century which means that generations of men across the globe were affected by some of the largest and most traumatic conflicts in human history which may skew the data. As the population of supercentenarians increases worldwide in a general sense and improved healthcare and nutrition play their part, we may witness some interesting shifts due to these outside circumstances.

Some researchers argue that the cause may have more to do with a regenerative decline between men and women, which would point to a biological cause. Adult stem cells are regulated in a sexually dimorphic manner (like flashy peacock feathers, for example), and they respond to sex hormones. This line of research could open up new explanations for how the sex hormones estrogen and testosterone may specifically modify lifespan. Moreover, there might be a difference in telomere length between males and females: these little caps at the ends of chromosomes help to signify the lifespans of cells. Further research is needed in order to understand how genetics might have an impact on stem cell aging in males and females and at the very least.


Age Range Patterns For Supercentenarians

Based on the global numbers, an interesting trend emerges regarding age distribution within supercentenarians. According to what's known as the Gompertz law, mortality rates tend to level off, or plateau, later in life after a steady increase throughout previous life, leading many supercentenarians appearing to be "stuck in time" as the aging process after 100 continues to decelerate. Because the Gompertz distribution has no upper limit, if the damage theories are true, meaning that lifetime probabilities are not zero, a Longevity record will be eventually destroyed infinitely. Despite this, there is a sharp spike in mortality at 113-117 (the mortality peak) and an immediate decline after, with the highest mortality at age 117, then an outlier effect beyond that.

Furthermore, while there appears to be a heavy slant towards females as is to be expected, it is even higher at ages above 114. Very few males reach age 114, whereas females reach this age every year in recent years. This irregularity represents an important area of focus in Longevity research over the coming decades.

As more and more people born later in the 20th century reach this status, the data and findings will be more reliable than those recorded during the turn of the 20th century. However, a core pattern has already emerged with the cases at hand and this pattern of mortality has been remarkably persistent over the past 20 years.


The graphic displays three common characteristics: 1) High mortality shortly after birth, 2) exponential growth (Gompertz law) in middle age, 3) leveling off in old age.

From the early 1950s onward there have been more female than male supercentenarians. Although the number of men in this category increases in the later part of the 1970s, at no point do women relinquish their lead.

Supercentenarians Distribution in the World


Supercentenarians are distributed throughout the world anywhere the population size and life expectancy are sufficient to generate this most-elite of population groups. Supercentenarians generally occur where the population size is at least 4-5 million persons and the life expectancy at birth is in the mid-70s or higher. That said, the supercentenarian population is somewhat modulated by the effects of climate.

We observe persons reaching age 117 in southern Japan but just age 113 in northern Japan. Okinawa - the southern prefecture - has the highest number of centenarians per capita of any Japanese prefecture and remains world-famous for remarkable Longevity. We see persons reaching 116+ in southern Europe but never above 115 in northern Europe. It is estimated that this is mostly due to the higher mortality rate of supercentenarians in the cold-weather months: particularly November, December, January, and February.


North America has not shown such a pattern, but this is likely due to the unique geography: with no mountain range separating cold (artic) air from warm air, the North American weather patterns are more widespread with few protective microclimates, with the possible exception of California.

Interestingly, Puerto Rico would show the highest prevalence of supercentenarians among people who reach extreme Longevity (approximately one supercentenarian per 10,000 inhabitants aged ≥95 years), although data on this country must be interpreted with caution owing to potential methodological limitations, mainly related to its small population. Prevalence is not the best possible indicator for comparisons of extreme Longevity data between different countries, and the very small population size of this country could have biased the prevalence values of supercentenarians.


Italians over the age of 100 are concentrated into the poorest, most remote and shortest-lived, while US supercentenarians are concentrated into populations with incomplete vital registries. Both patterns are difficult to explain through biology but are readily explained as economic drivers of pension fraud and reporting error.



Historically our picture of aging and of possible supercentenarians is incomplete. Data has improved over time, as we can see there are several regions with full or near full population data from 110 years ago and beyond. Our understanding will increase even further as the richness and accuracy of data improves.



While supercentenarians are found across the globe there is a clear relationship to standard of living and social stability to the number of supercentenarians a nation produces.



The last places of residence for supercentenarians closely reflect the properties such as standard of living, of the places in which they were born. How much of this is standards of care and how much is personal lifestyle is a question that researchers in Longevity look to tackle.

Supercentenarians Social Activity and Independence

One of the most important dimensions of the research is while living a significant length of time, how active and mobile are supercentenarians?

Our research and biographical findings show that the many supercentenarians continue working and maintain independence long past 100, with a few of them continuing in the fields they worked for the majority of their lives. Holding a job at 70 or 80, however, is very different than doing so at 100. Yet there are striking examples of people who did successfully carry on working after they hit the century mark and these examples we have provided in this report.

Based on the biographical data we have collected, it also appears that there is no consistent or planned dietary plan or secret behavior for their survival, with master athletes standing alongside composers. However, patterns of moderate food intake, moderate exercise level, fast walking, regular sleep-wake cycles, and mental balance appear to be repeating patterns of success for our longest-lived individuals. Negative habits, where present, are only in moderation. While it appears that the majority of mobile and socially-active supercentenarians are women, it also appears that both men and women show very little chronic age-related conditions that would otherwise render them immobile. This includes myocardial infarction and cardiovascular diseases, but also no history of strokes or other severe physical issues.


Furthermore, the majority of supercentenarians appear to be psychologically and intellectually acute with very few cases of dementia and other psychological debilitations. This is in contrast to centenarians, who appear to have a much wider variance in conditions, with a remarkably low rate of dementia.

This proves especially important as supercentenarians are frequently referred to as "living treasures" with their extensive firsthand experience, and being living connections to the distant past. It has a strong cultural significance that may grant them a special place in society, which has a feedback effect on mental and emotional health. Japan can serve as a positive example of what is possible as other populations around the world mature. While the number of people who must move into nursing homes will rise dramatically, so, too, will the number of vibrant, fully engaged senior citizens who continue to live at home unaided and work or volunteer well into their 80s, 90s or even 100s. This will likely be especially true as the first wave of baby boomers begins to crash against the retirement wall.

Supercentenarians Have "Super" Immune Systems

The new study "Single-cell transcriptomics reveals expansion of cytotoxic CD4 T cells in supercentenarians" reveals that immune cells profiled from supercentenarians have very unique characteristics. Supercentenarians are rare individuals who reach 110 y of age. They are endowed with high resistance to non-communicable diseases such as cancer, stroke, and cardiovascular disease. Demographers in Canada estimated that the chance of living more than 110 y is as low as 1 in 100,000. According to the population census covering the whole territory of Japan in 2015, the number of centenarians was 61,763, of which only 146 were supercentenarians. However the study of extreme Longevity comes up against a problem of methodology: how to validate claims about a person's age when there is an issue of the "lack of birth registration".

A distinctive feature of supercentenarians is a long healthy lifespan, maintaining relatively high cognitive function and physical independence even after 100 y of age. In other words, many supercentenarians can spend almost their entire lives in good health due to the delayed onset of age-related diseases and compression of morbidity. Therefore, supercentenarians can be considered a good model of successful aging, and understanding their attributes would be beneficial for superaging societies.

Factors that contribute to Longevity	Description
Relationships, social inclusion	Kindness, love and a strong sense of community actually make you healthier and happier. There is strong association between good health and positive emotions. Loneliness is harmful to your health. Seniors who report feeling left out and isolated have more trouble with everyday tasks like bathing and climbing stairs. They also die earlier than less-lonely folks do.
Socio-economic status	The socioeconomic level in appears to have an important latent effect on the production of centenarians in both females and males. There are important aspects of socioeconomic indicators: higher overall economic development level, public expenditure on health, mobile telephone subscribers as the standard of living, and the use of improved sanitation facilities for healthy aging.
Brain Activity	Brain activity has role in human aging and Longevity. For the first time, scientists have shown that brain activity has a significant influence on human life span. They demonstrate how neural activity is higher in individuals with shorter life spans and lower in those who live longer lives.
Physical Activity	Regular exercise delivers huge health benefits. It help keep brain cells healthy by delivering more blood and oxygen. In fact, research suggests aerobic exercise may delay or improve symptoms of Alzheimer's disease.
Genetic Factors	Scientists found that lifestyle plays almost no factor in health and Longevity after the age of 80, and that almost everything in advanced age is due to genetic factors.
Healthy Diet	It is important to eat a healthy diet rich in whole grains, vegetables, and fruits, and substitute healthier monounsaturated and polyunsaturated fats for unhealthy saturated fats and trans fats, take a daily multivitamin, and be sure to get enough calcium and vitamin D, maintain a healthy weight and body shape.
Conscientious	Conscientiousness refers to a person's ability to be self-disciplined, organized, efficient, and goal-oriented. Conscientious people may also have lower blood pressure and fewer psychiatric conditions, as well as a lower risk of diabetes and heart or joint problems.



Introduction: All Validated Supercentenarians

Introduction

1788 marks the birth year of the earliest known supercentenarian. This was Dutch soldier Geert Adriaans Boomgaard who when he died in 1899 became not only the first verified supercentenarian but also the longest lived person. He was surpassed for this title in 1902 by Englishwoman Margaret Ann Neve.

It is reasonable to assume that there have been earlier examples, but because they can not be verified they must be excluded.

There is also no manner of conclusively knowing whether supercentenarians have existed throughout human history, of if they are a relatively recent phenomenon. We also do not know the roles that culture, environment or individual genetics might have played or how these factors could be interrelated.

These gaps in our knowledge highlight the importance of not only accurate, but also comprehensive data over multiple fields to fully be able to understand the phenomenon of extraordinary Longevity.




All Supercentenarians Region Distribution by Gender






All Supercentenarians Distribution by Nations





Longest-Lived Supercentenarians by Country (Years)









Top-100 Longest-Lived Supercentenarians

As the number of retirees worldwide hits the one billion person mark to become the single largest identifiable social group, questions of length and quality of life become more relevant to more and more people.

Many ask if it is possible to slow down, stop aging. Others simply want to ensure that whatever years they do have are healthy and productive as possible.

What then can the longest lived supercentenarians tell us? Do they hold the secrets of human Longevity or are they simply random winners of a social and genetic lottery, nothing more than anomalies?

"Supercentenarians often seem to be born with slower clocks than the rest of us," **says Stuart Kim, a developmental biologist at Stanford University.** "When you meet them, they all look and act 20 years younger than they actually are."

Or could better, more comprehensive research will have to unlock the secrets of the supercentenarians. Research that would be guided by A.I. and incorporating all we know about the human genome and collecting personal and individualized data in real time?

This research has already begun and we do not know how far it will go.

\$1,000,000 was offered to whoever lived to 123 years to eclipse France's Jeanne Louise Calment for the title of all time longest lived person was made by Deep Knowledge Ventures general partner in 2015.

It is not unthinkable that someone alive today will break that record and collect their million dollars. Is it even unthinkable to envision a world where human beings reaching their supercentenarian years will seem like a normal part of life?

These are the mysteries of Longevity that we are now starting to unlock.




Top-100 Longest-Lived Supercentenarians Regional Distribution by Gender






Top-100 Longest-Lived Supercentenarians Distribution by Nation

Top-100 Supercentenarians Distribution by Gender








Japan's Kane Tanaka is currently the world's oldest human being.

As of August 27, 2019 she is 116 years old, seven years shy of eclipsing the all time record of 122 years held by Jeanne Louise Calment of France who passed away in 1997.

In total only eight people have lived past 116, and the only one other than Jeanne to survive past 117 is Sarah Knauss of Hollywood Pennsylvania, USA who passed away in 1999 at 119 years of age.

The 117 year boundary seems all but unbreakable. Except that it has been broken. Only twice, but these outliers open the possibility of exceeding the 122 year mark and beyond.

It is not likely however, that this can happen without sufficient and dedicated input and investment into the Longevity field

It is only with the recent advent of A.I. has it been possible to do so across disciplines with fact-based and data-driven decisions.




Ages of Oldest Living Supercentenarians by Country (Years)






Top-100 Living Supercentenarians Continental Distribution by Gender




Top-100 Living Supercentenarians Distribution by Age

Chapter III: Top-25 Socially and Professionally Active Living Centenarians

Top-25 Socially and Professionally Active Centenarians

There is little point in increasing human Longevity if the period during which we are no longer able to enjoy and participate in life does not also increase.

This is known as Health Adjusted Life Expectancy (HALE) and Quality Adjusted Life Expectancy (QALE).

A strong indicator of both quality of life and overall health is the ability to remain professionally and socially active.

Currently it's not correct to talk about validated supercentenarians who are professionally and socially active, because most of them are in a protected environment: a nursing facility, a care home, at home with live-in care. However, there are some noteworthy centenarians.

As our understanding of ageing increases and with greater investment in Longevity tech and medicine, it makes sense that active and engaged persons in excess of 110 years of age will eventually become a reality.

Is it impossible that this may include individuals from this current crop of centenarians?








Top-25 Socially and Professionally Active Centenarians Distribution by Nation

Chapter IV: Profiles of Top-100 Longest-Lived Supercentenarians



Jeanne Calment

Birthplace: Arles, France

Jeanne Louise Calment (21 February 1875 – 4 August 1997) was a French woman who reached the longest confirmed lifespan in history at 122 years, 164 days (44,724 days in total). Her lifespan has been thoroughly documented by scientific study; more records have been produced to verify her age than for any other case. She was the second verified and undisputed person to reach their 115th birthday (after Augusta Holtz), and the first verified and undisputed person to reach 116, 117, 118, 119, 120, 121, and 122. She remains the only person verified to have reached the ages of 120, 121, and 122.

Jeanne Calment was first publicly recognized for her Longevity when she was 111 years old. She reported that she had seen Vincent van Gogh (who died in 1890) when she was 13 years old. This claim made her appear in the 1990 movie Vincent and Me, where she played herself, and became the oldest person ever to appear in a film. After the death of Florence Knapp on 11 January 1988, she became the world's oldest verified living person and she became the oldest verified person ever in 1990, surpassing Augusta Holtz.

Sarah Knauss

Sarah DeRemer Knauss (24 September 1880 – 30 December 1999) was a validated American supercentenarian who is the second-oldest validated person in history, behind only Jeanne Calment. She is the longest-lived person in the history of the United States, and was the oldest person in the world from the death of Marie-Louise Meilleur on 16, April 1998 until her own death on December 30, 1999.

In 1995, Knauss said she enjoyed her life because she still had her health and could "do things". At age 116, Knauss was recognized as being the new United States national Longevity record holder, then thought to have been Carrie C. White (reportedly 1874–1991). In 1998, she became the world's oldest person when 117-year-old Canadian Marie-Louise Meilleur died. When her family members mentioned her newfound fame, Knauss responded with a smile and "So what?". Prior to her death, there were six living generations in her family.

Nabi Tajima

Nabi Tajima (4 August 1900 – 21 April 2018) was a Japanese supercentenarian who was the oldest validated person in the world at the time of her death and the third-oldest validated person ever. She became the oldest person in Japan following the death of the anonymous resident of Tokyo on 27 September 2015, and the oldest person in the world following the death of Violet Brown on 15 September 2017. She was the last validated person born in the year 1900.

Tajima was born and died on the small island of Kikaijima, about halfway between Okinawa and the main Japanese islands. She had nine children, seven sons and two daughters, and in September 2017 she was reported to have around 160 descendants, including great-great-great-grandchildren. She stated that her Longevity was due to sleeping soundly and eating delicious food. Guinness World Records was planning to certify Tajima as the world's oldest person, but she died at a nursing home in Kikai City before they could do so.

Lucy Hannah

Lucy Hannah (16 July 1875 – 21 March 1993) was an American supercentenarian who is validated as the fourth-oldest person ever, one of only nine people to reach 117, and the oldest African-American person ever.

Hannah was born Lucy Terrell in Linden, Alabama, and died in Detroit, where she had moved in the Great Migration to escape the racial tensions of the Deep South. She married John Hannah in 1901 and had eight children, only two of whom were living when Hannah died. Two of her sisters reached 100 and her mother reached 99. Before her death, Hannah claimed to be 118, but investigation by the Social Security Administration's "Kestenbaum" study in 2003 determined that her age at death was actually 117 years, 248 days.



Marie-Louise Febronie Chasse (29 August 1880 – April 16 1998) was born in Kamouraska, Quebec, in 1880, to fisherman parents. According to her family, she may have had some Native American ancestry. At the age of 18, she married Gerard Leclerc, another fisherman of her village. After he, two of her children and both of her parents died in 1911 and 1912, Meilleur left two of her four surviving children in 1913 and moved to the rural Ontario border. Only once, in 1939, did she return to the Quebec area. She married in 1915 Hector Meilleur, a Franco-Ontarian woodcutter, and with him, she had another children.

Marie-Louise lived on a wood house without electricity and hot water until the 1950's. Some sources said that she was vegetarian, but this is not confirmed. Marie-Louise smoked Tobacco until her 90's. She attributed her Longevity to "Hard work, remember the good times of her youth, loved her family, having a good sense of humor and having good faith to God and Mary".

Violet Brown

Violet Henrietta (10 March 1900 – 15 September 2017) was born in the small town of Duanvale, located in Trelawny Parish, Jamaica, which at the time was part of the British West Indies. Her father, John Gordon Mosse, worked as a sugar boiler. Her mother, Elizabeth Mosse, was a housekeeper. Violet had three other siblings. At a relatively late age, 13, she was baptized. At one point, she married Augustus Gaynor Brown. The couple had 6 children in total; four sons and two daughters. Her oldest son, Harold, preceded her in death in April 2017, age 97.

At the time of her 110th birthday, it was reported that, aside from deafness, Violet was in good overall physical shape. She stated that she didn't feel her age. She attributed her long life to God, respecting her parents as well, working hard and eating coconut sauce. Some of her favourite pastimes include going to church, reading books, and listening to music.

Emma Morano-Martinuzzi

Emma Martina Luigia Morano (29 November 1899 – 15 April 2017) was an Italian supercentenarian who, before her death at the age of 117 years and 137 days, was the world's oldest living person whose age had been verified, and the last living person to have been verified as being born in the 1800s. She remains the oldest Italian person ever and the second-oldest European person ever behind French woman Jeanne Calment.

Emma Martina Luigia Morano was the eldest of the eight children born to Giovanni Morano and Matilde Bresciani on 29 November 1899 in Civiasco in the Province of Vercelli in Italy. When she was a child, she moved from the Sesia Valley to Ossola for her father's job, but the climate was unhealthy there, so a physician advised her family to live somewhere with a milder climate so the family moved to Pallanza, on Lake Maggiore, where Morano lived until her death. She said she never took drugs, ate three eggs a day, and drank a glass of homemade brandy.

Chiyo Miyako

Miyako was born on 2 May 1901 in Wakayama Prefecture, Japan. Her husband, Shoji, worked for Japanese National Railways, which meant that she had the chance to travel. She enjoyed calligraphy, which she learned during her childhood and practiced well in to her old age.

Miyako was officially validated by the Gerontology Research Group on 3 August 2015. She became the oldest living person in Kanagawa following the death of 114 year-old Kiyoko Ishiguro on 5 December 2015, and the oldest person in Japan and the world following the death of Nabi Tajima on 21 April 2018. She was the last surviving validated person born in 1901.

Miyako died in Nishi-ku, Yokohama, Kanagawa prefecture, on 22 July 2018 at the age of 117 years, 81 days. Her death came just as evidence of her applications for the title of oldest person living were approved by Guinness World Records. Following her death, Japanese woman Kane Tanaka became the world's oldest person.

Misao Okawa

Misao Okawa (5 March 1898 – 1 April 2015) was a Japanese supercentenarian who is the third-oldest verified person ever from Japan and Asia and also was the oldest living person in the world from the death of the 116-year-old Jiroemon Kimura, who was also the oldest verified man ever, until her own death on 1 April 2015. She was the oldest ever person from Japan until 1 September 2017 when her age was surpassed by Nabi Tajima.

She married her husband Yukio, who ran his own business in Kobe, in 1919 and had three children, two daughters and a son. As of February 2013, only one of her daughters, Shizuyo (age 97), and her son Hiroshi (age 99), were still alive. Her husband died on 20 June 1931 at age 36. In 2000, she broke her leg at the age of 102. But later she said that she was doing leg squats. They had five children, three of whom were still living at her passing: Hilda(81), Irma(80) and son Anibal (78). She also had 11 grandchildren, 20 great-grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.



Susannah Mushatt Jones (6 July 1899 – 12 May 2016) was the oldest verified living person in the world from the death of 116-year-old Jeralean Talley on 17 June 2015 until her own death on 12 May 2016. At the time of her death she was the seventh-oldest verified person ever. She was also one of the last two living people verified to have been born in the 1800's along with Emma Morano of Italy. She was also the last surviving American person born in the 19th century.

As a young woman, she worked in the fields but she was determined to escape that hard existence. On 4 March 1922, she graduated from the Calhoun Boarding High School and the graduation roster recognized her for studying "Negro Music in France". After graduation she wanted to become a teacher and was accepted to Tuskegee Institute's Teacher's Program. However, her parents did not have enough money to pay for her college, so in 1923, she moved to New York during the early stages of the Harlem Renaissance. Ms. Jones became a nanny and took care of many children of wealthy parents.

Gertrude Tonpon Weaver (née Gaines) (4 July (or April) 1898 – 6 April 2015) was an American supercentenarian of mixed race who was, briefly for 5 days, the oldest living person in the world following the death of Misao Okawa on 1 April 2015, until her own death. Upon her death, Jeralean Talley became the world's oldest validated living person.

Weaver was born in Lafayette County, Arkansas. She married Gennie Weaver on 18 July 1915 and had four children. She was widowed in 1969. At 104, she moved to the Silver Oaks Health and Rehabilitation Center in Camden. Weaver did not have any chronic health problems typical of people her age; she slept well and did not drink alcohol or smoke. Weaver told the Associated Press that there were three factors that have contributed to her Longevity: "Trusting in the Lord, hard work, and loving everybody". Weaver added a fourth factor when she told Time magazine that trying to do your best is another factor adding: "Just do what you can, and if we can't, we can't" or, in other words, "Kindness".

Ikai was the first known supercentenarian to be autopsied, following her death.

Maria Giuseppa Robucci was born in 1903 in Poggio Imperiale, province of Foggia, Apulia region, Italy. On 3 December 1928, she married Nicola Nargiso. The couple had five children. Jeralean and Alfred remained married for 52 years until he died on 17 October 1988, at the age of 95. Her daughter Thelma stated that Jeralean had remained active in her later life by making quilts, sewing dresses, and playing the slot machines at casinos. She bowled until she was 104 years old, but she still went on annual fishing trips. In May 2013, when she was 114 years old, she caught 7 catfish. Talley lived by the motto: "Treat others the way you want to be treated". She advised people to use common sense, saying, "I don't have much education, but what little sense I got, I try to use it".

Manfredini was born on 4 April 1897 in the small comune of Pievepelago in the Emilia-Romagna region of northern Italy. In 1920, shortly after marrying Riccardo Manfredini, she emigrated to Iowa, United States. The couple had four children in total. Manfredini worked in an ammunition factory during World War II, and cleaned houses until she was 90. After her husband's death, Manfredini lived alone for about 42 years until moving into a nursing home in 2007 at the age of 110. She survived colon cancer at the age of 101. She 'danced' at the age of 103 and was still able to shovel snow when she was 106. Apart from three living children, she also had seven grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren, and 12 great-great-grandchildren at the time of her death.

Thomas Peter Thorvald Kristian Ferdinand Mortensen, known as an adult as Christian Mortensen (16 August 1882 – 25 April 1998), was a Danish- American supercentenarian. He is the oldest recognized male ever to die in the United States, and the oldest recognized person ever born in Denmark. He was the last surviving person documented as born in 1882.

Christian Mortensen was born in Skarup, Skanderborg, Denmark, on 16 August 1882, and he was baptized in Fruering Church on 26 December 1882. In Denmark, Mortensen had worked as a farmhand and apprenticed as a tailor. In 1903, he immigrated to the United States, and lived in various areas and worked in various trades including as a milkman and in a can factory. He apparently was married though only briefly and never had children. Mortensen enjoyed an occasional cigar, and, very unusually for a supercentenarian, was known to show a bit of feistiness even in his final years. In 1973, he rode his tricycle to the Aldersly Retirement Community in San Rafael. Mortensen lived there for his final 25 years.


Charlotte Hughes

She is 220 days older than Annie Jennings, the next oldest British supercentenarian. She was the 4th verified supercentenarian to turn 115. She drank tea and said it has helped with her Longevity. Ms. Hughes was also the oldest person to fly at age 115 (in 1992), and the Concorde at that. Ms. Hughes also held the record for the longest operating bank account (101 years). Over 25 years after her passing, her UK record remains unsurpassed. Hughes was never interviewed by demographers or other aging researchers, though the historian Peter Laslett went through the documentation pertaining to her case.

As of April 2008, she had five grandchildren, 14 great-grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. Parker lived alone on a farm on Blueridge Road after her husband had died when she was 45. Mary Ann Rhodes was a Canadian supercentenarian who, at the time of her death, was the third oldest person in the world, and second oldest person in Canada. Despite reaching the age of 115, Rhodes never became the oldest living person in Canada, or even Ontario, due to Marie-Louise Meilleur, who passed away one month after Rhodes, at the age of 117. Rhodes was statistically old enough to be the world's oldest person in an average year. Due to being in "second place," Mary Ann Rhodes was never in the major-media limelight, having been featured only in local media coverage.

Mary was born in South Lake, Leeds, Ontario on 12 August 1882. In 1912, she married Victor Rhodes; the couple had one child, a son called Murray. Victor died in 1954, and Mary continued to live in Seeley's Bay until 1968. She lived in her own home until 1986, when she moved to the Providence Manor nursing home in Kingston. She died on 3 March 1998, at the age of 115 years, 203 days. She remains as the second oldest Canadian person ever to this day.

She was a resident of the district of Shibuya, Tokyo. She was the fourth-oldest verified living person in the world, according to the Gerontology Research Group. She had been the oldest living Japanese person since the death of Misao Okawa on 1 April 2015; but was not officially verified until 1 July 2015.

She died on 27 September 2015 aged 115 years, 196 days. After her death, Nabi Tajima (born 4 August 1900) became Japan's oldest person.

While her name was never publicly disclosed by the MHLW, a photograph of her wall in a 2011 photo suggested her name was Harumi Nakamura.

Gertrude Baines

Gertrude Baines was an American supercentenarian who was the oldest living person in the world from the death of Maria de Jesus on 2 January 2009 until her own death eight months later. She married Sam Conly at a "very young age" and had a daughter, Annabelle, who died of typhoid fever at age 18. Baines lived at the Western Convalescent Home in Jefferson Park, Los Angeles when she died. She lived on her own until she was 105.

When asked what she credited to her Longevity, she answered, "God. Ask him... I took good care of myself, the way he wanted me to." Baines, a daughter of former slaves, cast a vote for Barack Obama in the 2008 US presidential elections. On 11 November 2008, Baines surpassed Carrie Lazenby's (1882–1996) record of (114 years, 218 days), to become the oldest person ever who was born in the state of Georgia. She became the oldest living African American following the death of Arbella Ewing on 22 March 2008, and the oldest living person in the United States following the death of Edna Parker on 26 November 2008.

Emiliano was born the son of Delfin Mercado and Gumercinda del Toro. Emiliano worked in the cane fields until the age of 81. He never married and never had children, but said he had three "girlfriends" in his life. Emiliano became the oldest man in the world, with documents supplied so far including a birth certificate, baptismal certificate, 1910 census record and veteran ID card. By January 2005 Guinness had accepted Emiliano as the "oldest living man whose age could be fully authenticated. "In addition, as a veteran of World War I, he broke the record for longest-lived veteran of any military force that was set by Mathew Beard, albeit as a non-combat veteran. In 1993 he was honored by U.S. President Bill Clinton with the medal commemorating the 75th anniversary of the signing of the truce that ended World War I. Mercado del Toro, the elder of two siblings, had to move from his familiar Cabo Rojo grounds due to a fall he had in his home when he was 102, which affected his hip bone. His 85 year-old niece took him to live with his relatives.

Bettie Wilson was an American supercentenarian who, at the time of her death, was the third-oldest person in the world, behind Maria Capovilla and Elizabeth Bolden. Bettie Antry Rutherford was born on 13 September 1890, in Mississippi, the daughter of slaves (her mother had Bettie at age 45). She was the youngest of nine siblings. Growing up, she had little formal education, and taught herself to read and write. She married Rufus Rogers, and the couple had a son before Rufus died. She then married the Rev. Dewey Wilson in 1922, and the couple had 2 children. The marriage with Dewey lasted 72 years. In her later years, Ms. Wilson was interviewed by the University of Mississippi and Georgia State University and her recollections are now a part of the oral history archives at the University of Mississippi, Oxford. "That's a nice way to go."

Susan Elizabeth "Susie" Gibson was an American supercentenarian. She currently ranks as one of the 40 oldest people ever. In addition to her age, Susie was in remarkable shape, able to be interviewed by NBC and others and still mentally fit until her final months. Unlike those confined to a nursing home, Susie went out to eat at O'Charley's restaurant regularly, even up to age 115. Susie Potts married James W. Gibson in 1915. He died in 1955, and her only son, James Jr., died in 1987, aged 70. At age 92, Susie recalled that she rescued a drowning boy who had fallen off a boat into a lake. Susie lived on her own until age 104, when she moved into a nursing home in Tuscumbia, Alabama. 10 years later, aged 114, she was one of the world's oldest people. In November 2004, Susie was interviewed, at age 114, and was able to talk more than an hour, remembering such things as the sinking of the Titanic in 1912, or that horse-drawn carriages would get stuck in the mud. Susie also recalled finding minié balls along the creeks near the old Shiloh battlefield. Susie Gibson died less than 72 hours later, in the early hours of 16 February 2006, at the age of 115 years, 108 days.

Augusta Louise Holtz was born in the Prussian Province of Posen of the German Empire, modern-day Poland, in 1871 to Michael and Wilhemina Henrietta (Quade) Hoppe. According to her granddaughter, she lacked a birth certificate that would authenticate her claim and therefore was not listed by Guinness World Records. However, the birth record actually existed in the Polish archives,transferred from Germany, which the family was not then aware of. Her age was later verified by the Gerontology Research Group in 2012. At the time of her death she was the oldest verified person ever up until that point and the first person known to have reached the age of 115. Her age was surpassed by Jeanne Calment in 1990.

Augusta moved to the U.S. at age 2 in 1873. Her father owned a farm near Troy, Illinois. She grew up with three siblings. She married Edward Holtz in 1900, who died in 1923. She had four children with him – two sons (Edward and Augustus) and two daughters (Hester and Gertrude). She later moved to St. Louis County, Missouri, where she died at the St. Sophia Geriatric Center in Florissant.


Maria Gomes Valentim

She was the world's oldest verified living person from 4 November 2010, upon the death of Eugenie Blanchard, to her own death on 21 June 2011. She was the only verified supercentenarian from Brazil until the verification of Alida Grubba Rudge on 28 July 2015. After Eugenie Blanchard died on 4 November 2010, Maria, at the age of 114, became the world's oldest person. However, her claim wasn't verified until 18 May 2011.

On March 9, 2019, Tanaka was recognized as the World's Oldest Living Person by Guinness World Records.

Giuseppe Ottaviani is an Italian centenarian and masters athlete.He turned 100 in May 2016. He is the first and only centenary athlete to make triple jump. Giuseppe is the current indoor world record holder in the M95 and M100 60 metres. He also held the indoor world record for the triple jump In World Masters Championships. After serving in the Italian Air Force during World War II, he spent his career as a men's tailor. He won his first national championship in 1999. Giuseppe was coached by Graziano Bacchiocchi and then in 2010, Mauro Angelini coached him to high jump. After turning 95 in 2011, he became the first 95-year-old athlete to surpass 2 meters for the long jump and 4 meters for the triple jump. He drives himself the 25 km from his home in Sant'Ippolito to the training facility in Fano. Giuseppe lives by two mottos: "For me, sport is life, sport is joy" and "curiosity drives me to live". At age 94 he bought a wireless ADSL computer, and at 97 he enrolled in the University of the Third Age in Fossombrone.


Ida Keeling

Ida Keeling is an Caribbean American centenarian track and field athlete. Trained by her daughter Cheryl (Shelley) Keeling, herself a World Record holder, Ida holds Masters records in 60 meter and 100 meter distances for women in the 95-99 and 100-plus age groups. Her story was featured in a segment in the Carl Reiner-hosted documentary If You're Not in the Obit, Eat Breakfast, on aging over 90, which premiered on HBO in June 2017. She goes whatever distance she can and if she start a race, Ida finish it. She is always the winner for her age group as she doesn't have no competition. I'm usually chasing myself. But I go with what I've got left. I go to the gym, I ride my bike, I work out, I stretch, I reach, I do push-ups, I do upper weights, I get on the floor and turn my feet up over my head, and when I don't get out, I stay right here and work out in my room. I'm as healthy as a 25-year-old, my doctor says. I have no intention of slowing down. Age ain't got nothing to do with it. When you really want to do something for yourself, go and do it. And if you fail, try, try, try again.

He graduated from Abraham Lincoln High School in Brighton Beach, Brooklyn. He graduated from Brooklyn College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1943. During World War II he served as a lieutenant in the United States Navy from 1943 to 1946. His duties included serving as deck officer on board the submarine USS Jallao, where he also ran the radar equipment. He graduated from Columbia Law School with a Bachelor of Laws in 1948.

James Ephraim Lovelock

James Ephraim Lovelock is an independent scientist, environmentalist, and futurist. He is best known for proposing the Gaia hypothesis, which postulates that the Earth functions as a self-regulating system. With a PhD in medicine, Lovelock began his career performing cryopreservation experiments on rodents, including successfully thawing frozen specimens. His methods were influential in the theories of cryonics (the cryopreservation of humans). He invented the electron capture detector, and using it, became the first to detect the widespread presence of CFCs in the atmosphere. While designing scientific instruments for NASA, he developed the Gaia hypothesis. In the 2000s, he proposed a method of climate engineering to restore carbon dioxide-consuming algae. He has been an outspoken member of Environmentalists for Nuclear, citing the effects of carbon dioxide as being more harmful to the environment, and warning of global warming due to the greenhouse effect. He has written several environmental science books based upon the Gaia hypothesis since the late 1970s. His latest book was published in July 2019. It is called Novacene: The Coming Age of Hyperintelligence.


Jessie Lichauco

Lichauco joined the Asociación de Damas de Filipinas and devoted time to Settlement House, which was run by the Asociación. Together with her husband, she opened their temporary shelter in Santa Ana to war refugees, transforming it into a makeshift hospital during World War II. The facility served at least 2,000 people. After the war, she continued her devotion towards Settlement House and became its president for nine years. Lichauco is also one of the founders of the Red Feather Agency, later known as Community Chest, which raises funds for member charities. Lichauco also supported about 100 youth in completing their education in her own capacity. Jessie Lichauco served as the Ambassador's hostess, representing the Philippines in international organizations and events. The Ambassador's residence in Palace Green was open to Filipino businesspeople, students, workers, and tourists. Later she opened her house in Massachusetts to Filipino scholars and students needing a place to stay. Lichauco was the subject of the documentary film Curiosity, Adventure, & Love, in which she portrayed herself. The film includes her migration to the Philippines, the meeting with her husband, Philippine history from her perspective, and her insights on the Filipino people during World War II.


Mieko Nagaoka

Birthplace: Yamaguchi, Japan

Mieko Nagaoka is a Japanese Masters athlete. She is first 100-year-old to complete a 1,500m freestyle swim in a 25m pool. At the age of 104 she is Japan's oldest active swimmer. She first started swimming at 80 years old to recover from a knee injury. In the beginning, Nagaoka didn't know how to swim. She used to go into the swimming pool to do exercises for her knee. At 82, she started to learn how to swim on her own. At 88, she made her first appearance at the Masters Worlds in 2002 in Christchurch, New Zealand and took the bronze in the 50m backstroke. She achieved national recognition in Japan at age 90 when she established a world record in the 800m freestyle. She currently holds 24 World Records. In 2015 she became the first 100-year-old to complete a 1,500m freestyle swim in a 25m pool. Nagaoka trains four times a week for two hours under the tutelage of long-time coach Shintaro Sawada. She likes to swim longer distances because she swims slowly and is able to keep her own pace. Nagaoka currently lives alone in Tabuse, Yamaguchi, Japan. In Nagaoka's family, swimming transcends every generation, from her son to grandchildren, and she encourages other swimmers to keep swimming as long as possible. After turning 100 in July 2014, she released a book entitled: I'm 100 years old and the world's best active swimmer.

Robert Marchand

Robert Marchand is a French centenarian cyclist. Marchand was born in Amiens, near the frontline of the First World War. Marchand was a firefighter in Paris in the 1930s. He was a prisoner-of-war during World War II. He then moved to Venezuela, where he was a lorry driver and sugarcane planter. In the 1950s he went to Canada, where he had a job as a lumberjack. He returned to France in 1960 and worked as a gardener and wine dealer until 1987. He took an active part during the strikes of 1936 in France that gave birth to the modern era foundations of French employment legislation. Aged 35 he finished seventh in the Grand Prix des Nations in 1946. He returned to cycling in 1978 and continued training after his 100th birthday. On 4 January 2017, he set a world record in one-hour track cycling in the over-105 age group, covering 22.547 kilometres (14.010 mi) in one hour, and the 105 years old centenarian declared: "I could have done better, if I had seen the 10-minute warning card, otherwise I would have pedalled slightly faster". At the age of 105 he was recognised as the world's oldest competitive cyclist by Guinness World Records.

Stanislaw Kowalski

Kowalski was born on April 14, 1910, in the village of Rogówek, then part of Congress Poland within the Russian Empire, where he lived until the end of the 1930s. After his marriage, he moved to Brzeźnica. In 1952, due to the broadening of the boundaries of the military training ground, he had to move out of his newly built house and live in Lower Silesia, in the village of Krzydlina Wielka, where he ran a small farm and worked as a railroad lineman. He has been living in Świdnica since 1979. Kowalski comes from a long-living family; his mother lived to be 99. For several dozen years, Kowalski rode to work on a bicycle regardless of the weather outside. In 2014, A 104-year-old Kowalski has set a European record for the 100m, becoming the oldest person to complete it. He is eight years older than the previous record holder and ran the distance more than a second faster, crossing the line in 32.79 seconds.

Sumner Murray Redstone is an American businessman and media magnate. He is the majority owner and chairman of the board of the National Amusements theater chain. Through National Amusements, Redstone and his family are majority voting shareholders of CBS Corporation and Viacom (itself the parent company of Viacom Media Networks, BET Networks, and the film studio Paramount Pictures). According to Forbes, as of September 2015, he was worth US\$5 billion. Redstone was formerly the executive chairman of both CBS and Viacom. In February 2016, at age 92, Redstone resigned both chairmanships following a court-ordered examination by a geriatric psychiatrist. He was ultimately succeeded by Les Moonves at CBS and Philippe Dauman at Viacom, where he currently serves as chairman emeritus.

In 1940, Shinoda had her first solo exhibition at Kyukyodo Gallery. She began working on abstract paintings in sumi by 1945. Shinoda traveled the United States from 1956 to 1958. She came into contact with the works of Jackson Pollock, which left a deep impression on her. She moved beyond traditional calligraphy towards an expressive, abstract style. During her time in the United States, she had a number of exhibitions, which helped to make her name. Her works were bought by a number of high-profile collectors. Shinoda also became involved in the abstract expressionist movement of the time. She returned to Japan and continues to work. She turned 100 in March 2013. She has remained unmarried and considers herself as married to her work.

Tsuneko Sasamoto

Sasamoto was born in Tokyo, Japan. She went to college of home economics, but quit because she had an ambition to become a painter. After the dropout, she went to an institute of painting (without telling parents) and a dressmaking school. Sasamoto started her career as a part-time illustrator on the local news pages in Tokyo Nichinichi Shimbun (now Mainichi Shimbun, one of the newspapers in Japan). At 26, she got promoted to a probationary employee in 1940 when she joined the Photographic Society in Japan, officially becoming the first female photojournalist in Japan. She calls Margaret Bourke-White a major influence in why she became a photographer. Sasamoto photographed subjects from General Douglas MacArthur during the American occupation of Japan to striking coalminers and protesting students. She published a photo book in 2011 called Hyakusai no Finder, or Centenarian's Finder. In 2014, Sasamoto had an exhibit of her work from her 2011 book called Hyakusai Ten, or, Centenarian's Exhibition. In 2015, Sasamoto published another book, Inquisitive Girl at 101. She broke her left hand and both legs in 2015 but continues to photograph. Sasamoto is currently working on a project called Hana Akari, or Flower Glow. The book is in honor of her friends who have died.
